She has been the coordinator of the 2300 square foot vegetable plot in the Master Gardener Demonstration Cards at the Springfield Botanical Gardens since 2009. Master Gardener class of 2003. Master Gardener Emeritus.

CREATE AN INSPIRED KITCHEN GARDEN. Discover the secrets to creating a stunningly visual, edible garden that feeds your mind, soul, and body. The Master Gardeners of Greene County have created a European potager – also known as a kitchen garden – at their public demonstration garden at the Springfield Botanical Gardens in Springfield, MO. Methods include no-till, vertical structures, cold frames, low tunnels, square foot gardening, and companion planting.

PATRICIA TURSI, Ph.D. In 1987, Patricia received Georgia Master Gardener Training, and in 2003, Missouri Master Gardener Training. A retired psychologist whose dissertation focused on mind/body interactions, it soon became apparent that healthy minds depend upon healthy bodies and healthy bodies depend upon healthy foods. She has been a psychotherapist, and educator, a gardener, and currently works for the Parks Department as a part-time, seasonal employee at the Springfield Botanical Center.

DEALING WITH DROUGHT. This talk focuses on soil amendments and practices that can help reduce intensive labor, save on watering, nutrient additions, and still contribute to successful growing during heat and drought. Primarily focused on small garden food productions, it can also be applied to ornamental and larger scale growing. It is not focused on lawns, but can be applicable.

BARB EMGE has been growing herbs for over 37 years. She has a huge collection of herbs, citrus trees, and scented geraniums. She has owned Red Barn Herb Farm since 2004. Barb gardens using only organic gardening principles. Master Gardener class of 2005.

HERB GROWING FOR BEGINNERS. This class is for those who have never grown herbs before or have had minimum experience with growing. I will discuss growing and using the 20 most common herbs, with plants on hand to pass around for attendees to see, touch, and smell. I will bring an herbal treat, if requested.

HERBS 201-ADVANCED HERB GROWING. This class is for those who have successfully grown herbs. I'll discuss propagating your own herbs and introduce some of the more unusual and heirloom varieties. I will also discuss growing herbs organically. Interesting historical facts and new research involving herbs will be included. Plants will be passed around.

BIBLICAL HERBS AND HERBS IN HISTORY. This class is for those who are proficient in growing herbs, but want more knowledge about the historical uses of herbs. Plants will be brought to the class.

GROWING HERBS IN THE CLASSROOM. This class is geared for science teachers. Lots of interesting historical, culinary, and scientific information regarding herbs and growing herbs in the classroom are discussed. Plants will be brought to the class. GROWING HERBS IN THE OZARKS. This class will cover herb growing with more experienced growers. It allows for more questions and answers about specific problems you may have had, as well as introducing more herbs you may have not grown yet. Plants will be brought, and herbal treats will be provided upon request.

SCENTED GERANIUMS. These distant cousins of geraniums were discovered by English sailors in the 1600s in South Africa. They are easy to grow and can be used in cooking, potpourri, perfumes, and some even repel Japanese beetles. Some of the 75 varieties we grow are lemon, lime, orange, coconut, rose, mint rose, lemon rose, apple, apple cider, nutmeg, peppermint, peppermint rose, black pepper, strawberry, and lemon raspberry. Herbal treats and recipes will be brought to class.
